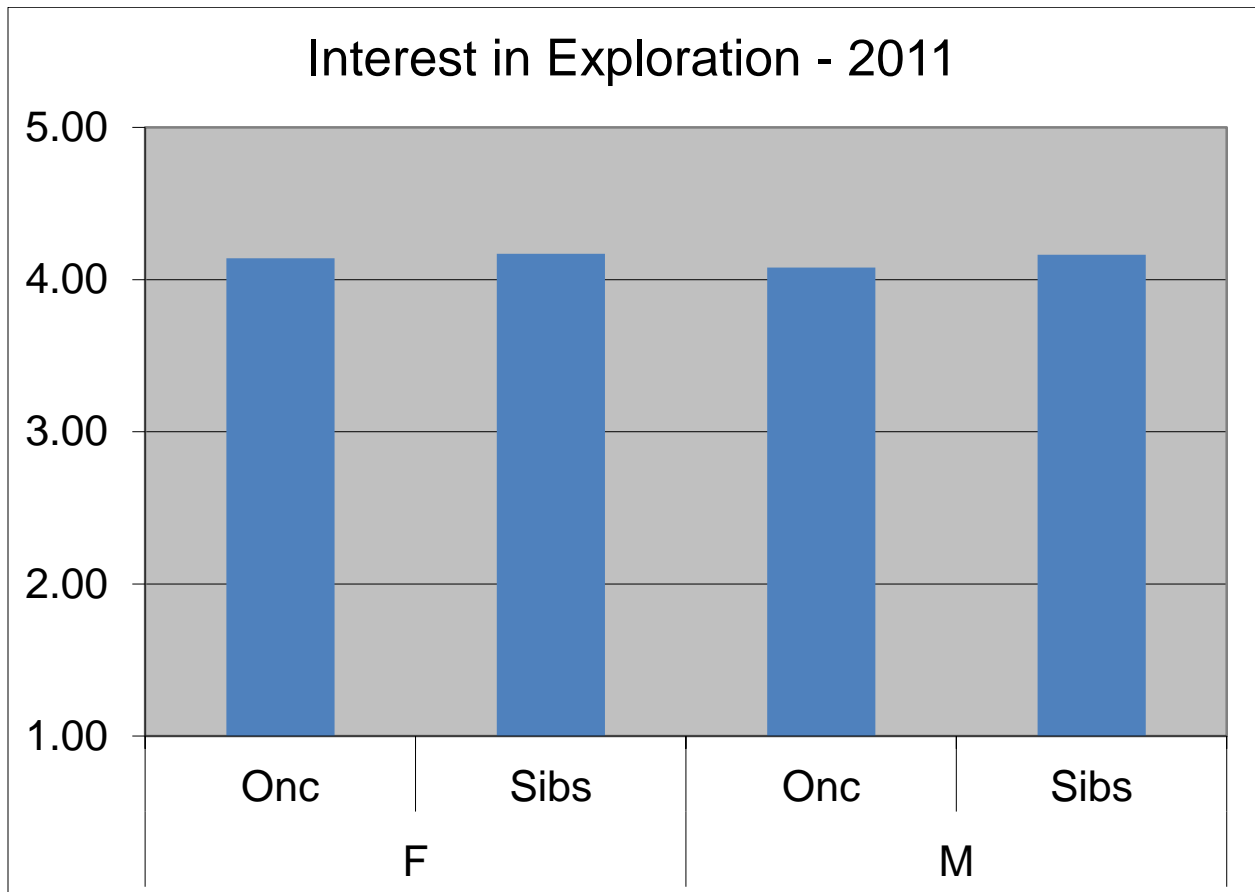
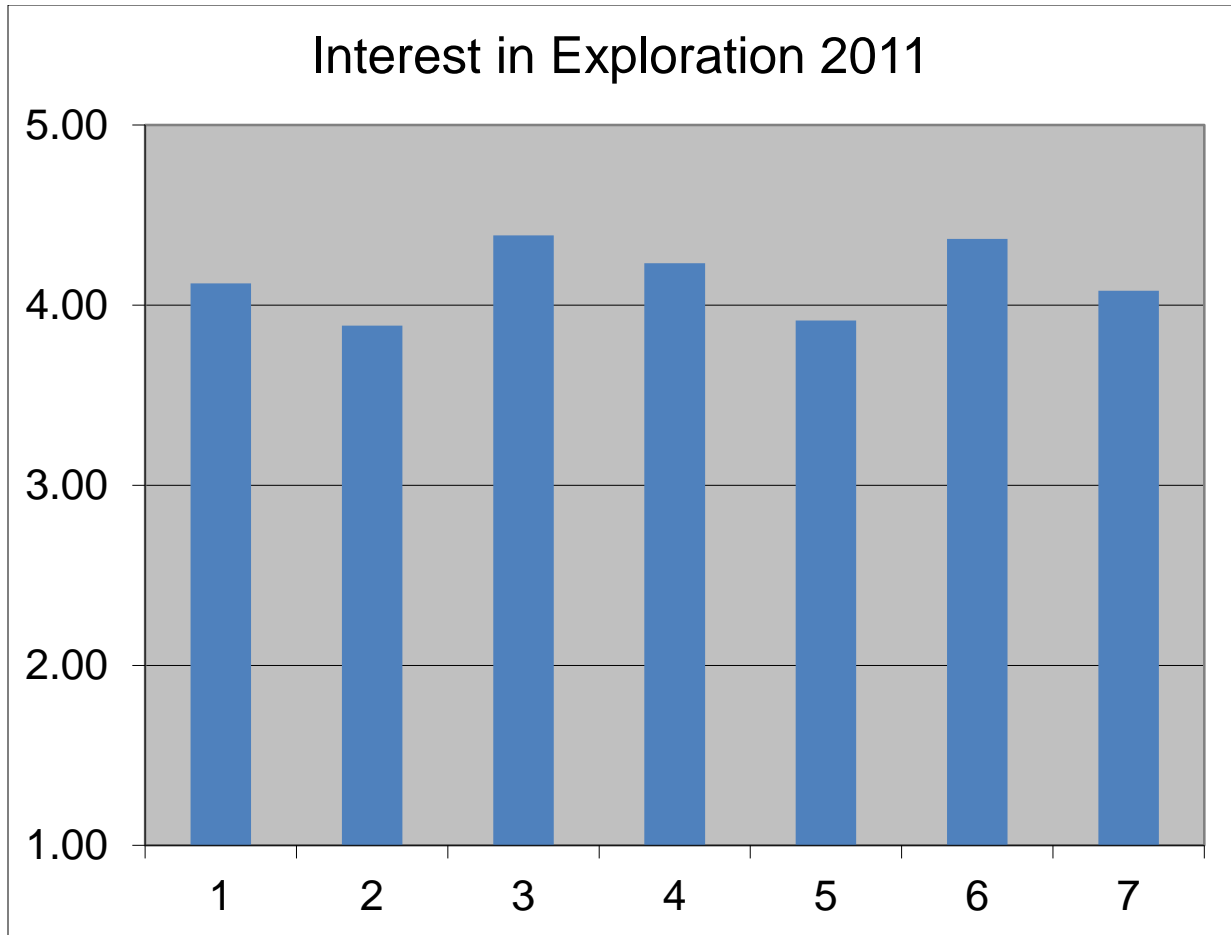


Older Campers Outcomes Evaluations: Interest in Exploration and Responsibility

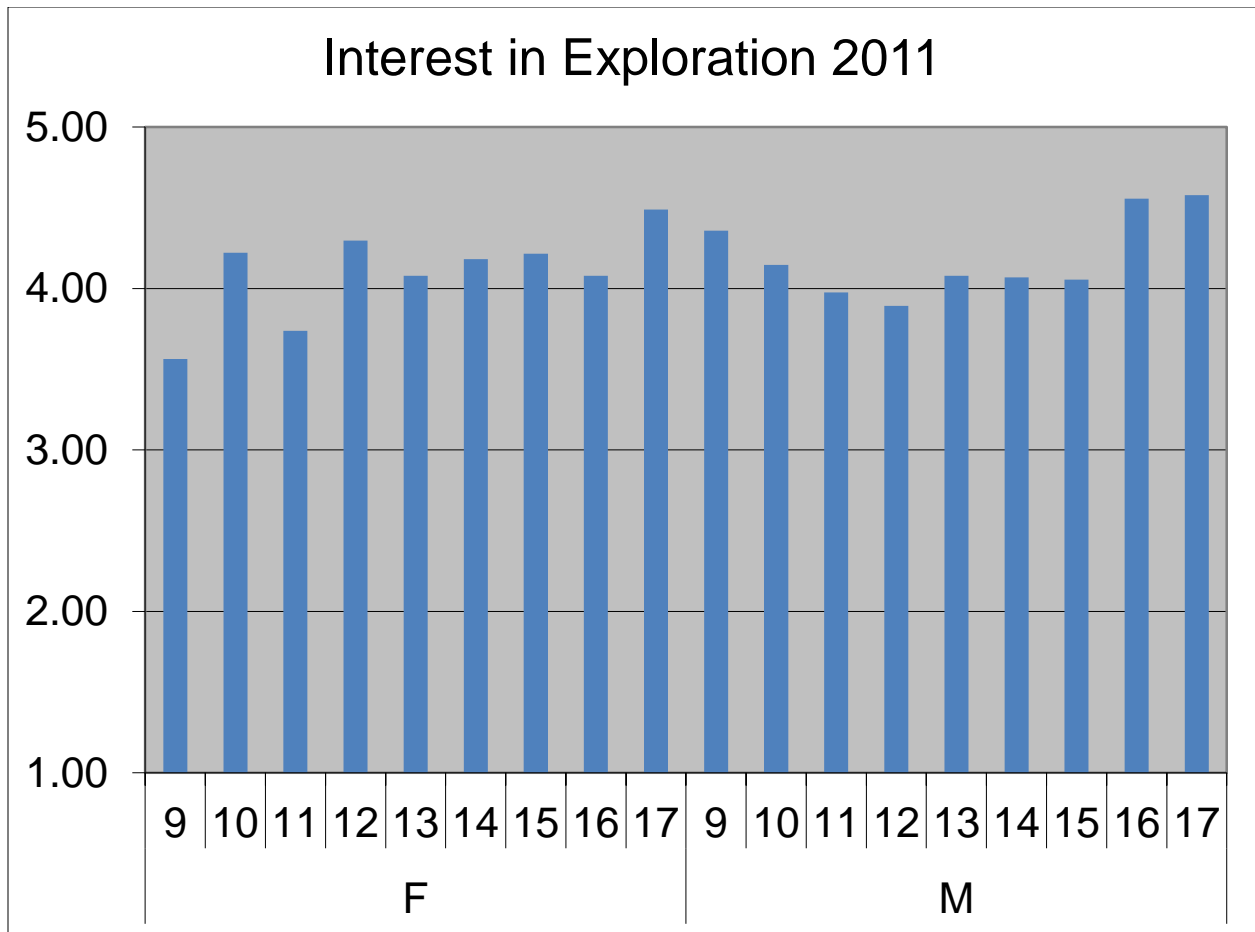
A total of 477 older campers filled out the ACA Basic Outcome Questionnaires on Responsibility and Interest in Exploration. The Responsibility instrument has 6 questions about accepting responsibility for mistakes, correcting mistakes, apologizing to those who have been made to feel bad, and not blaming others for our mistakes. The Interest in Exploration instrument has 8 questions about meeting new people, learning new activities, learning about new ideas, thinking about new things, and visiting new places. Both of these instruments are answered on a 5 point scale, indicating that their knowledge in the area questioned 1 = decreased, 2 = did not increase or decrease, 3 = increased a little bit maybe, 4 = increased some I am sure, and 5 = increased a lot I am sure. The overall average score on the Responsibility instrument for these 477 campers was 3.75. The overall average score on the Interest in Exploration instrument for these 477 campers was 4.14.



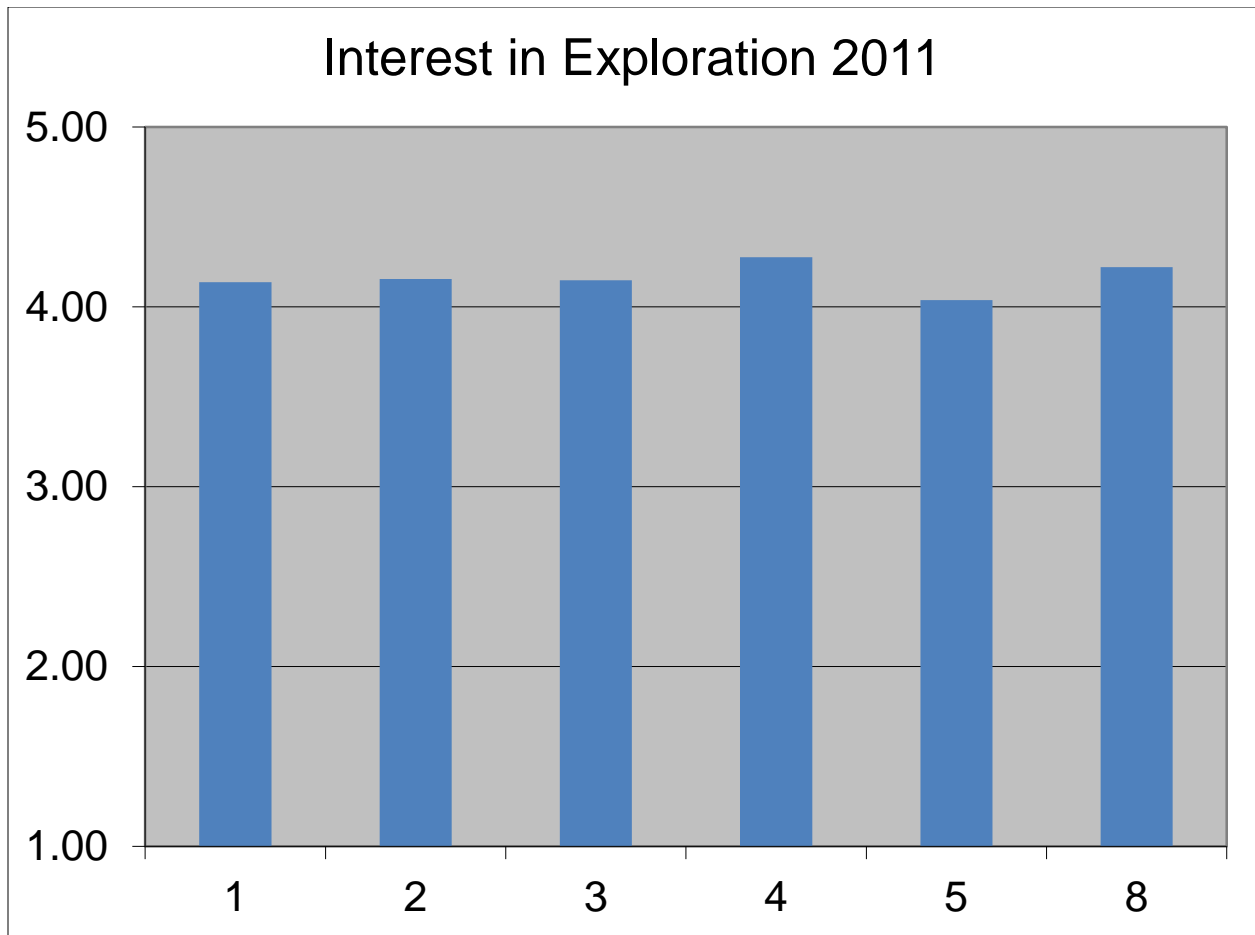
This chart shows the average value for the IE outcome for all older campers (N = 477) separated by gender and program.



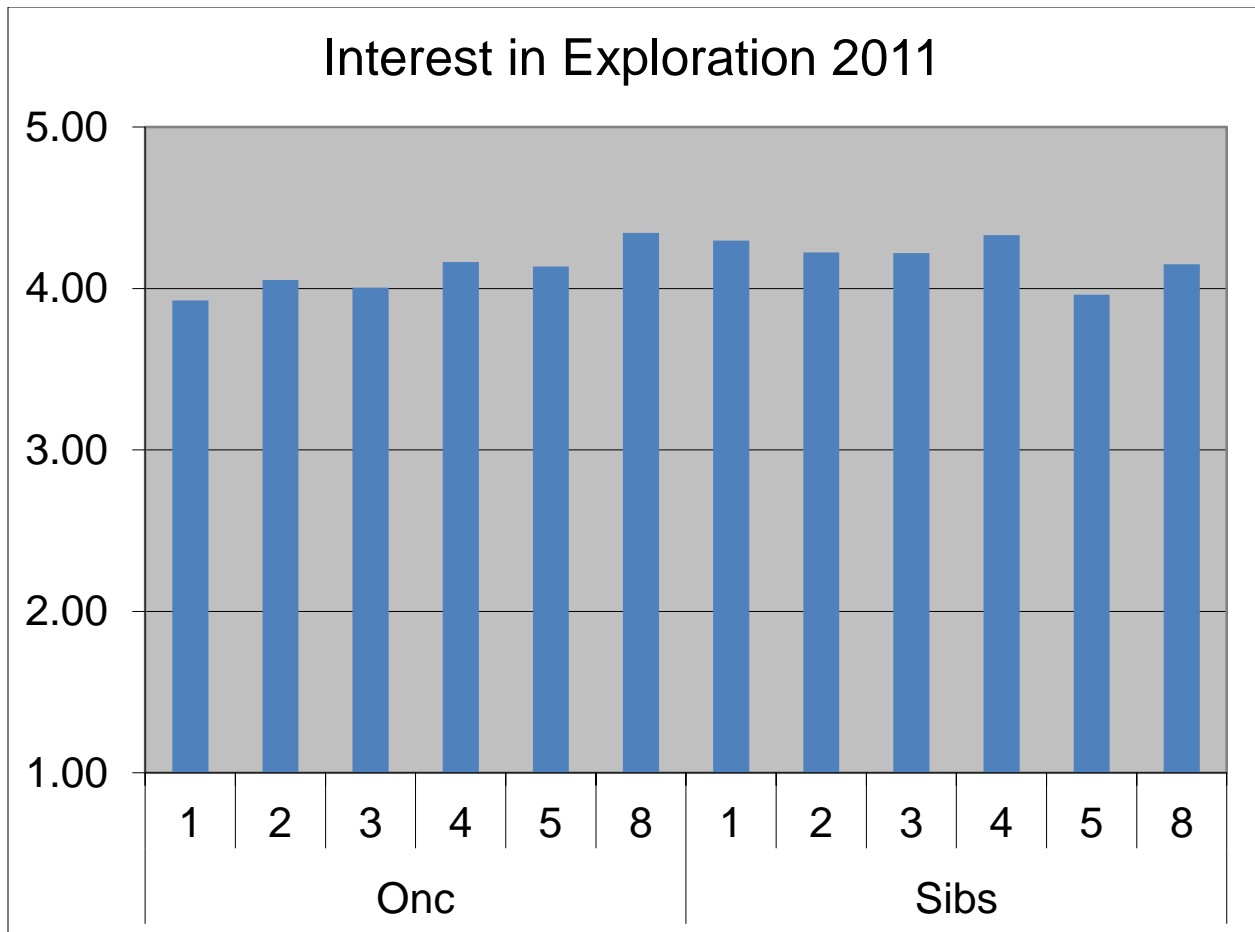
This chart shows the average value for the IE outcome for all older campers (N = 477) separated by camp week.

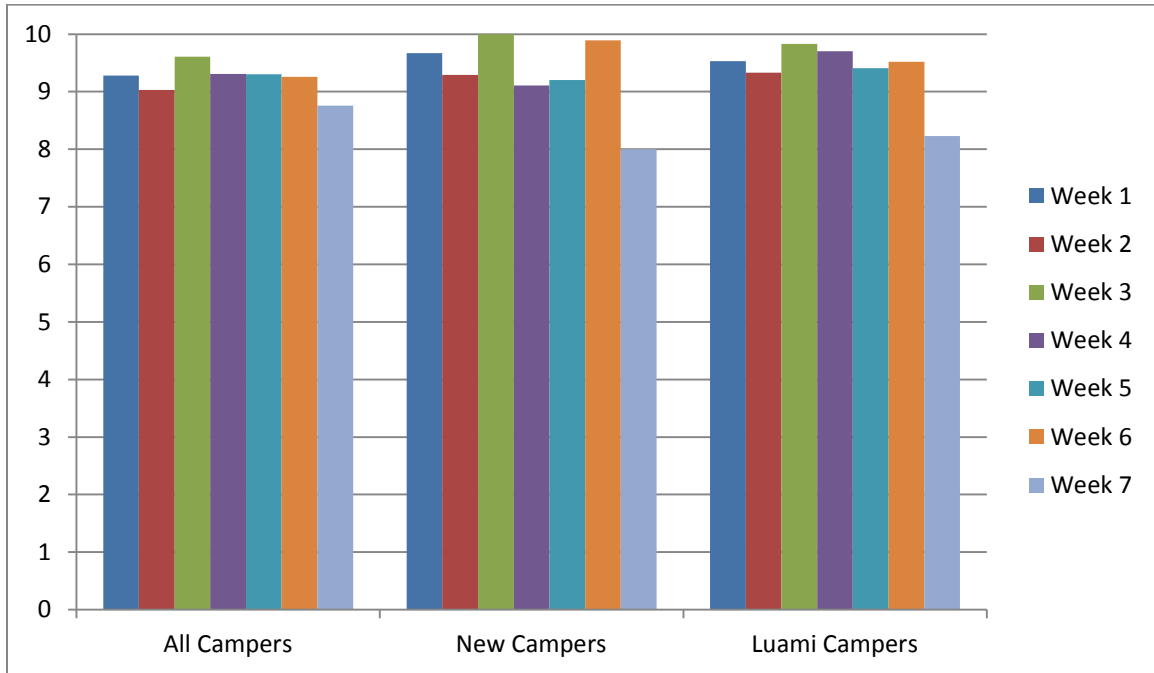


This chart shows the average value for the IE outcome for all older campers (N = 477) separated by program and years at camp (5 = 5, 6, or 7 years and 8 = 8 years or more).

The average interest in exploration score (range 1 – 5) for all older campers (N = 477) was 4.14. 89% of campers felt that their interest in exploring new activities and making new friends probably increased at least a little. 68% felt sure that it increased some. 20% answered “increased a lot, I’m sure” to all 8 of the IE questions (IE score = 5.0). There were no significant differences in the score based on gender, program, age of camper, camp week, or number of years of camp attendance.

On the Responsibility outcome measure, the average score (range 1 – 5) for all older campers (N = 477) was 3.75. 80% of these campers felt that their ability to take responsibility for their own actions, correct their mistakes, apologize if they hurt someone’s feelings, and not to blame others probably increased at least a little. 48% felt sure that it increased some, and 10% answered “increased a lot, I’m sure” to all 6 of the Responsibility questions (Responsibility score = 5.0). There were no significant differences in the score based on gender, program, age of camper, camp week, or number of years of camp attendance.

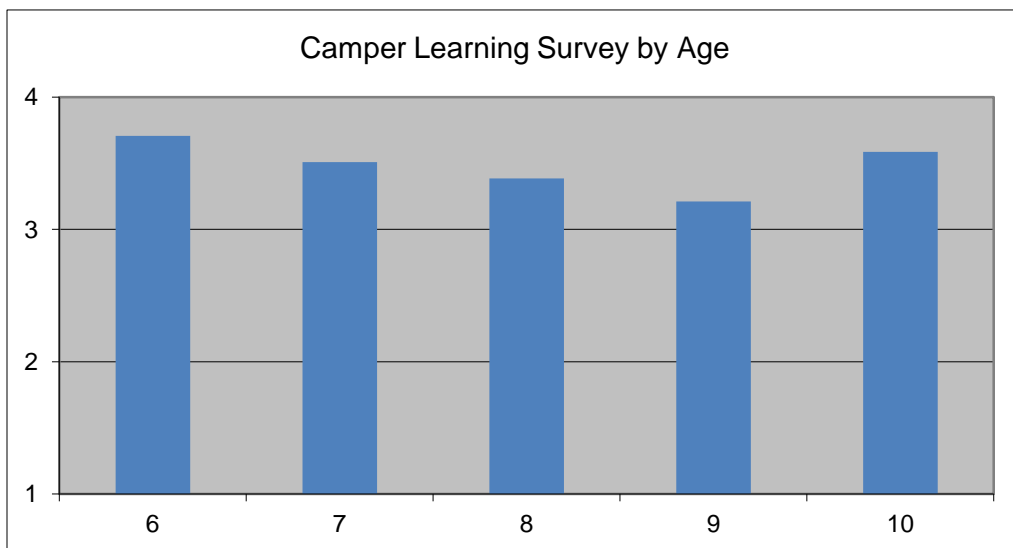
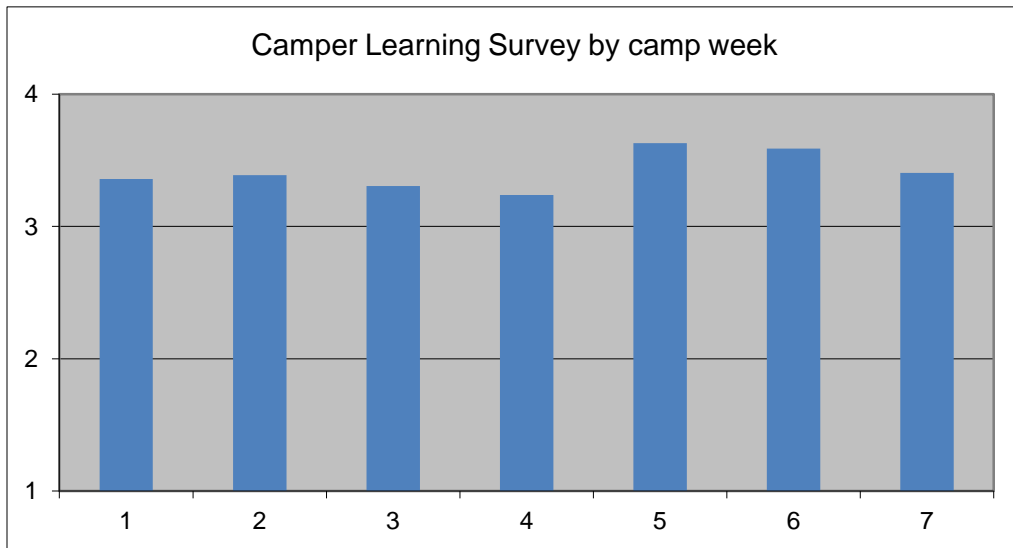
2011 Overall Satisfaction (1 – 10 scale) by week

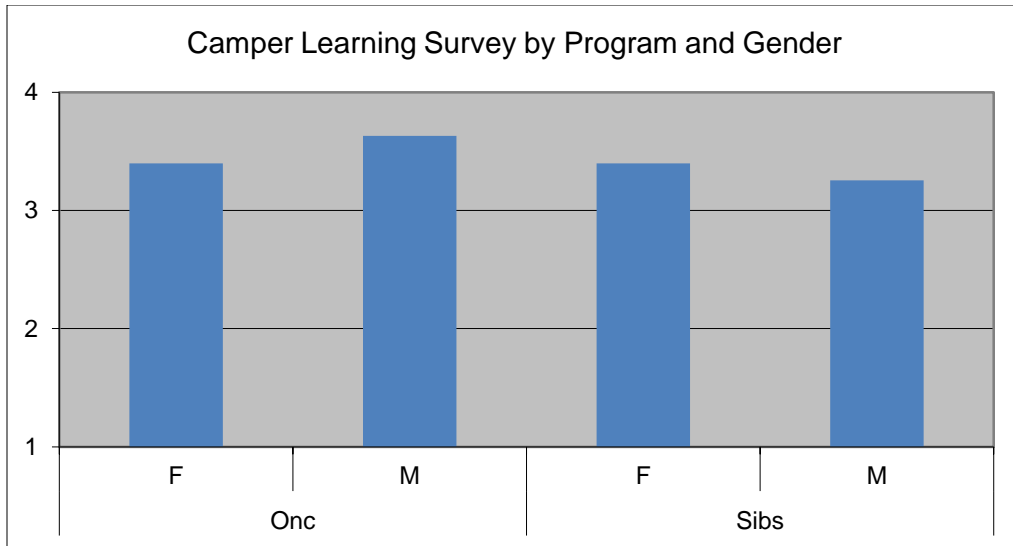


The campers were asked to rate their overall camp experience on a 1 to 10 scale, with 1 being “absolutely the worst” and 10 being “the best thing ever.” The overall average rating for 477 older campers was 9.25. The results for this older camper group are displayed above for all campers, new campers, and Luami campers (teen boys) broken down by week.

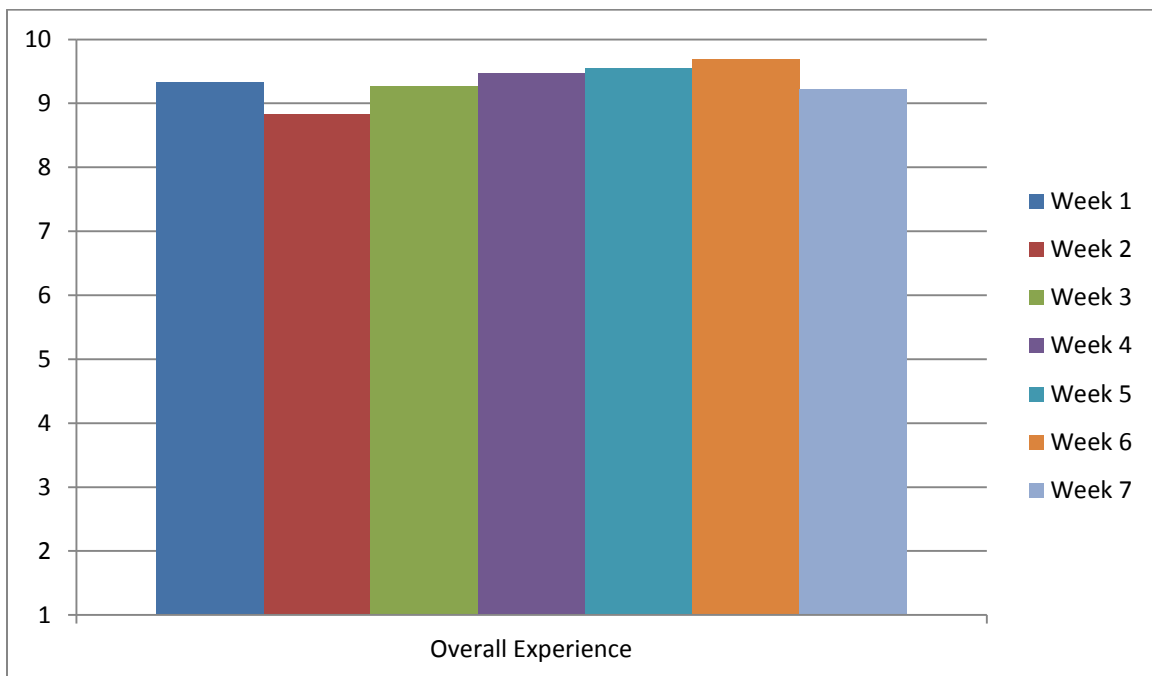
Younger Campers Learning Survey

A total of 126 younger campers took the Camper Learning Survey which asks questions across seven domains: friendship skills, perceived competence, independence, family citizenship, interest in exploration, teamwork and responsibility. The answers are on a 4 point scale where 1 = "I didn't learn anything about this," 2 = "I'm not sure," 3 = "I learned a little about this," and 4 = "I learned a lot about this." The average score for all 126 campers was 3.42, and 86.5% of the campers felt that they had learned a little or a lot about these topics during their week at camp (average score >2.8). There were no significant differences based on age, gender, program, or camp week.

The campers were asked to rate their overall camp experience on a 1 to 10 scale, with 1 being “absolutely the worst” and 10 being “the best thing ever.” The overall average rating for 126 younger campers was 9.33. The results are displayed above for all younger campers broken down by week.
